ACCREDITATION

St. Stephen's and St. Agnes School is accredited by the Virginia Association of Independent Schools (VAIS), through an accreditation program that is recognized and approved by the Virginia State Board of Education and the International Council Advancing Independent School Accreditation (ICAISA). Academic Program

The Upper School offers a strong college preparatory program that graduates students who are resourceful, independent thinkers. They are encouraged to participate in class discussions, make ethical and aesthetic judgments, think critically, and articulate their ideas by writing and speaking clearly. Students complete courses in nine areas of study: English; History; Mathematics; Science; Technology; Modern and Classical Languages; Religion; Performing, Visual, and Design Arts; and Physical Education. Students may enroll in six or seven courses. Students are required to maintain one unscheduled period and are limited to a maximum of two unscheduled periods.

Advanced Placement Program

Enrollment in AP courses is dependent on departmental approval and successful completion of pre-requisites. Students are limited in the number of AP courses they are permitted to take in a given year. Tenth grade students may take one AP course; 11th grade students are limited to two AP courses; 12th grade students are limited to three; exceptions to these conditions must be approved by the director of the Upper School. All AP students are required to sit for the AP exam in May.

Certificate Programs

The Certificate Programs provide students with an opportunity for deeper study and exploration in these academic areas. Students who complete the requirements for a Certificate are recognized through notation on the final academic transcript as well as in the program at Commencement.

WORLD LANGUAGE CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

The purpose of the World Languages Certificate is to: prepare our students to be engaged global citizens, create an opportunity for students to be recognized for studying two world languages and engaging deeply with global issues, support and increase student engagement in the study of multiple world languages at the Upper School, and promote and support intercultural experiences beyond the World Language classroom.

STEM CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

The STEM Certificate Program supports students with a deep interest in STEM fields. A STEM Certificate is earned through completion of coursework, application of STEM thinking through participation in a STEM related activity, and through completion of an independent STEM related experience.

FINE ARTS CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

The Fine Arts Certificate Program aims to recognize and celebrate the achievements of Upper School students who have demonstrated exceptional dedication and talent in the arts. A Fine Arts Certificate is earned through completion of coursework, sustained involvement in arts leadership and engagement, and completion of an independent arts-related capstone project.
